### NEW CASE STUDY SITE IN IRELAND

Sunrise over Inch Island, our latest case study site in Donegal, Ireland.

In 2020, Donegal County Museum will be working with the community of <u>Inch</u> <u>island</u> - located at the neck of Lough Swilly, the Lake of the Shadows - to bring their heritage to life using digital tools.

The island has some of the most fertile soil in Donegal and rich agricultural and maritime heritage, along with an extraordinary history. There are megaliths, <u>souterrains</u>, ring forts, the ruins of a medieval castle, links to the <u>Siege of Derry</u>, an abandoned church and graveyard, a historic Mason's Lodge, and a unique <u>military fort</u>, built in 1812 to protect Ireland from a potential invasion by Napoleon, and remodelled in the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century.

We have already made contact with a number of the islanders and our open evening in late January had a full house. Watch out for work recording and capturing sites and documents in future newsletters and at dedicated case study twitter account <u>@CINE\_Donegal</u>.
